GWIN inked a letter of intent with online casino software provider Live Cast Media, enlisting the latter to provide its online poker turnkey software solution. GWIN plans to launch two online poker sites, WARPoker.com and WARPoker.net, WAR being an acronym for Wayne Allen Root, GWIN's flagship brand. WARPoker.com will be a real money online poker site, open to international player markets, including Asia and Europe, but will exclude U.S. players, due to the iffy legal status of online casino gaming in the U.S. GWIN's second planned site, WARPoker.net will offer online poker games in the non-rake model permitted by many jurisdictions in the United States.

GONDER NAMED INTERIM MISSOURI LOTTERY **DIRECTOR.** The Missouri Lottery Commission named Gary Gonder, director of communications, to serve as interim Missouri Lottery executive director. The commission unanimously approved Gonder during a meeting on May 12. Gonder was named acting director subsequent to the resignation of Jim Scroggins, who has accepted the position of executive director for the new Oklahoma Lottery. Scroggins last day with the Missouri Lottery is June 2. Gonder has served as the Missouri Lottery's communications director since 1992. He is a graduate of the Lottery Futures College and the Erewhon State Lottery Case Studies Program. Gonder is a past recipient of the National Association of State and Provincial Lotteries (NASPL) Powers Award and the Missouri Governor's Award for Quality and Productivity. He is a past chairman on the board of the Missouri Alliance to Curb Problem Gambling. Gonder holds a bachelor's of journalism degree and a master's of public administration degree from the University of Missouri. Prior to coming to the Missouri Lottery, Gonder served eight years as the director of the Missouri Film Commission.

ANNE TASKER JOINS TABCORP'S EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MANAGEMENT TEAM

Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer Matthew Slatter today announced the appointment of **Anne Tasker** to Tabcorp's Executive Committee management team. Ms. Tasker has been appointed Executive General Manager Strategy and Development, reporting directly to Mr Slatter. Her most recent position was President – Europe, Middle East and Africa for Beverage Partners Worldwide (a joint venture between Coca-Cola and Nestle). Johnson's first task will be to oversee the state's first temporary slots facility, Miller's Restaurant on Main Street in Bangor, and the company's harness racing program at Bangor Raceway. He will also be in charge of the permanent slot facility at Bangor Raceway once it is implemented. Johnson's 28 years of gaming industry experience has included positions at some of the world's top casinos, including Caesar's Palace and Park Place Entertainment.

VIDEO GAMING/RACINOS

VLT'S OPEN AT BATAVIA DOWNS. Batavia Downs reopened Wednesday with new Video Lottery Terminals. The harness racing track now features 586 gaming terminals. \$2 million was spent to add the video gaming machines making Batavia Downs the fifth racino in the state. The track shut down last year for financial reasons and management hopes the new VLT's will mean big money for the track and community. Games include Double Diamond, Bullfroggin, Blazing 7's, and Wall Street Winners ranging from \$.01 cent to \$5.00. One-third of the wins from the machines will go to Batavia Downs and management says that cash should help the track pay off its \$9.2 million debt load within the next 10 to 12 years. Officials believe it will have a positive impact on surrounding communities.



DRAFT REGULATIONS FOR LICENSURE OF RACINOS ISSUED FOR COMMENT. Pennsylvania's

Gaming Control Board held a public meeting yesterday in Harrisburg. Three items were addressed at the meeting. First, the Board heard an update on thecomment process concerning the draft temporary regulations for manufacturer and supplier licenses. Second, the Board approved the issuance of draft temporary regulations providing general licensing requirements for all gaming facility operators and specific licensing requirements for category 1 ("racino") operators. Third, the Board heard a report concerning best industry practices for the Bureau of Investigations and

AS CLOCK TICKS ON SESSION, CANTERBURY **CASINO STILL IN PLAY.** Gov. Tim Pawlenty's decision to pull his gambling proposal from consideration in the House doesn't spell doom this session for a proposed casino at Canterbury Park racetrack, its chief supporter said Wednesday. Rep. Mark Buesgens, R-Jordan, said that in the next few days he would bring the so-called racino proposal directly to the House floor for an up-or-down vote. He hopes for support from lawmakers worried that Pawlenty's decision leaves them \$200 million short of what they want to spend Buesgens's bill would give owners of the Shakopee track permission to add slot machines and more table games to existing horse betting and poker tables. The state lottery would be involved in operating the casino. The House passed a budget in late March that assumed \$200 million from gambling proceeds. But it laid out a more austere course should a gambling expansion not be approved -- a spending plan too lean even for many Republicans, Buesgens said.

RACINO PLAN TESTS TRACK RECORD OF REAL

about \$25 million to reopen Tioga Park in Nichols as Tioga Downs Racino, a track with video slot machines that's projected to create 377 jobs. The real estate magnate is trying to revive two harness tracks in upstate New York. One has been shuttered for two decades, the other festers in bankruptcy. It could cost another \$40 million to resuscitate Vernon Downs, near Utica. To succeed, Gural will need to apply his real estate specialty: renovation. Gural is president of Newmark & Co., New York City's No. 2 commercial property manager, according to Crain's New York Business.



CHURCHILL BIDS FOR 16-HOUR SLOTS

Churchill Downs officials said Thursday that they would limit operation of the hundreds of slot machines they hope to install at the Fair Grounds racetrack to an average of 16 hours a day. That is considerably more hours than many neighbors want to allow and more than the City Planning Commission voted for last week, but significantly less than Churchill had sought earlier. The final decision is up to the City Council, which is expected to decide the issue June 16.

TRUMP'S CASINO COMPANY EMERGES FROM CHAPTER 11. With a new name, a big bankroll and a challenge as big as you-know-who's ego, Donald Trump's casino company emerged from bankruptcy protection Friday. The casinos, which remained open throughout the Chapter 11 filing by Trump Hotels & Casino Resorts, now face the task of winning back gamblers who took their coin cups and wallets to rival casinos that added hotel rooms, retail developments and other attractions while Trump barely had two \$5 chips to rub together.

SCHWARZENEGGER PLANS TO BLOCK URBAN-AREA CASINOS Governor lists 200 cities in state where he will oppose any proposal by tribes. Stepping up his opposition to tribal casinos in urban areas, Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger said he will block any proposal to put the gambling outlets in more than 200 cities throughout the state. The move comes as an increasing number of tribes are seeking to build casinos off their reservations and follows nearly a year of fierce community opposition to a proposed San Francisco Bay area casino. Schwarzenegger issued a proclamation stating he will oppose tribes' efforts to acquire land in urban areas to build casinos. He also said he will approve casinos only if the community where the casino would be built supports the project. According to the administration, Schwarzenegger will block the development of new casinos in 204 cities large and small -- from tiny Yucaipa west of Palm Springs to Anaheim to sprawling Los Angeles.

LOUISIANA'S FINAL RIVERBOAT CASINO TO OPEN THURSDAY The 15th and final riverboat casino allowed by law in Louisiana opens Thursday as Pinnacle Entertainment Inc. unveils its \$365 million gambling resort in Lake Charles. The L'Auberge du Lac Hotel & Casino joins an already competitive fray in southwestern Louisiana for the attention and wallets of casino players from nearby Texas. The Lake Charles market already has a pair of two-riverboat complexes run by Harrah's Entertainment Inc. and Isle of Capri Casinos Inc., and a slot-machine casino at the Delta Downs race track in Vinton.

IOWA LOTTERY DEBUTS FIRST EVER

ELECTRONIC SCRATCH GAME A slot machine wouldn't have fit into your pocket -- until now. "Quarter Play," the world's first-ever electronic lottery card, made its statewide debut at the Southern Hills Hy-Vee in Sioux City on Monday. "If you've ever played quarter pull tabs, it's like playing 80 of those," said Karen Smith, Iowa Lottery promotions and events manager. "But instead of scratching, you're pushing." The credit card-sized game costs \$20 and comes with 80 random plays that, with a touch of the play button, appear on three small screens on the front of the card. Each play is like that on a slot machine or scratch ticket, where the three numbers on the screen must match up in the right combinations to receive points. The points are worth 25 cents each, and players can win up to \$500 with the points they accumulate. Every card is guaranteed to win at least \$3, and can be redeemed like any other lottery ticket.

APRIL A RECORD MONTH IN VIRGINIA

The Virginia Lottery saw record breaking sales in April, making it the highest sales month in the Lottery's 17-year

history. The chart-topping \$130 million in sales surpassed the previous monthly record set back in 2002 by \$3 million and is 19% higher than the previous April's sales. All product categories recorded increases, and Mega Millions topped the list by increasing sales an astonishing 77.5%, which is attributed to the \$205 million jackpot on April 22. The Lottery also surpassed the \$1 billion sales mark in April and is on track to have another record sales year for FY 2005.

KANSAS LOTTERY RE-LAUNCHES ESCRATCH

GAME. The new version boasts a top prize of \$50,000 and the best odds of any Kansas Lottery game to date. In addition to enjoying higher payouts and improved odds, eScratch players will be able to choose from more than 20 entertaining and interactive Internet games, including Hunting Bonanza, Groovy Hoops, Casino Golfer, Monopoly and Spin Words. "Sales of eScratch have been somewhat disappointing since the initial launch of the game one year ago," said Kansas Lottery Executive Director Ed Van Petten. "Our players have suggested ways to make the game better, and we've listened. We think Kansas Lottery players will really like the new eScratch, and we're urging them to give it a try." In addition to improving the odds, upping the top prize to \$50,000, and adding a variety of new interactive games, the Kansas Lottery has made eScratch easier to play by revising the pricing and prize payout structure and adding an optional play slip. A new Name in Lights feature, which allows players to compete for high score, is another enhancement.

EDUCATION AT THE CENTER OF N.C. LOTTERY DEBATE.

North Carolina Senate leadership pushed a budget through the chamber May 5 with a lottery provision that might give new life to the House lottery bill. The budget's lottery provision would amend the lottery bill narrowly passed by the House in early April if the Senate votes in favor of the House measure. Several staunch opponents of the lottery voted for the budget because of strong support for other parts of the bill. "I'm forced to vote for the lottery," said Sen. Ellie Kinnaird, D-Orange. Kinnaird said she voted for the budget because it would increase the cigarette tax and includes funding for public education. The budget would raise the cigarette tax by 75 cents and would allocate education funds based on the number of school districts in a county. But Kinnaird's vote for the budget does not change her stance on the lottery. "I'll never vote for a free-standing lottery," she said. If both the Senate budget bill and the House lottery bill are passed, lottery revenue would not go to higher education, as the House bill stipulated, but fund school construction and educational programs such as Gov. Mike Easley's "More at Four" program. Rep. Bill Owens, D-Pasquotank, a primary sponsor of the lottery bill that

passed in the House by two votes, was reluctant to pass judgement on the Senate's proposed budget.

VT PROMOTIONS REVERSE TRI-STATE

MEGABUCKS DECLINE \$155 Million Powerball Jackpot Estimated for May 21 Drawing. The Vermont Lottery announced today that the Powerball jackpot for the Saturday, May 21 drawing is an estimated, annuitized \$155 million. The estimated cash value is \$87.8 million. This is Powerball's highest jackpot since December 8, 2004. While our Tri-State Megabucks sales have been declining over the last few years, innovative promotional efforts have now reversed this trend, according to Vermont Lottery Executive Director Alan Yandow. "Megabucks has been around since 1985, so we knew we had to look outside the box for new ideas," said Yandow. Megabucks promotions such as: instant cash prizes; trips; free tickets and more have reenergized player interest and, year to date, resulted in sales above projections. Yandow continued, "The Vermont Lottery is strongly committed to all Tri-State Lotto products, and continually looks for ways to increase player interest."



CAMELOT SET TO REVEAL LOTTERY GAINS.

Television presenter Kirsty Gallacher has helped National Lottery operator Camelot boost sales for the second successive year. Advertising campaigns have hit the jackpot after Kirsty launched a service that allows people to play by texting on their mobile phones and actress Fay Ripley featured as Lady Luck. Tomorrow, Camelot will report a rise in sales for the second year in a row to more than £4.7bn. Sales for the year to the end of March are thought to be £100m higher than the previous year. Chief executive Dianne Thompson, who was set to quit before Camelot began the process of bidding for a third licence next year, is now likely to stay, at least until a preferred bidder is picked in 2007. Camelot has signed up the millionth player to its website while the interactive operation has seen sales rising to about £87m from £12m in the previous year.

NEVADA DEMOCRATS TRY TO REVIVE LOTTERY

PLAN. Assembly Democrats are trying to breathe life into their Nevada lottery proposal - an idea that seems like a natural for this gambling state but is opposed by Senate Republicans. Although AJR2 was voted down earlier this session by the Senate Judiciary Committee, Assembly Speaker Richard Perkins, D-Henderson, said Monday he's negotiating with leaders in the GOP-controlled Senate in efforts to orchestrate a lottery comeback. Advocates said a lottery could generate up to \$50 million a year in state revenues that could be used to help pay for school supplies and class-size reduction.

HOUSE VOTES TO END SPORTS LOTTERY

GAMES. After two decades without the NCAA basketball tournament, the state of Oregon moved one step closer Friday to getting it back. The Oregon House voted 51-0 to pass House Bill 3466, which would abolish state-run sports

lottery games. The vote marked the most significant movement in the debate over Sports Action, a game founded in 1989 to help fund athletic departments at the state's seven public universities. In 1999, Senate Bill 455, which also aimed to abolish the game, died in committee. The bill will replace the sports lottery money by earmarking for athletic departments 1 percent of the lottery's Administrative Services Economic Development Fund. The bill stipulates that 70 percent of that money should fund non-revenue-producing sports, and 50 percent of the total should fund women's sports. The bill moves to the Senate, where it probably will face more opposition than it did in the House. Among its opponents is the Oregon Education Association, which represents 43,000 educators.

NEBRASKA LOTTERY INTRODUCING NEW

LOTTO GAME. The Nebraska Lottery is introducing a new Lotto game, developed in part as a result of direct player input. Nebraska Pick 3 will go on sale across the state at 6 a.m. on Sunday, May 22. The first Nebraska Pick 3 drawing will be held on Monday, May 23. Nebraska Pick 3 drawings will be held six days a week, Monday through Saturday. Drawing results will be released to the news media and the public by 10 p.m. each night. Prizes in Nebraska Pick 3 will range from \$1 to \$600. The odds of winning will range from 1 in 4.12 to 1 in 1,000. In all, there will be 9 ways to win. Nebraska Pick 3 will give players the chance to not only select the numbers they wish to play, but also the opportunity to decide what type of play style and potential prizes to play for.
